


Hollywood Hills owned by the designer to the stars tells the story of a woman totally at ease in the showbusiness world, from its colourful furnishings to its cinematic views.

Born in Boulder, Colorado, Kari moved to Los Angeles in the 1980s as a model and musician, then think it's our creative understanding that unites us," she says.

Once Emilio had given her that initial push, Kari never looked back.

In 1994, she launched her company KWI, which proved a hit, and in 2007, she found herself back on TV, this time fronting the series *Designer to the Stars: Kari Whitman*, where she was seen working her magic on the homes of the famous.

Key to her success, she says, is the rapport she builds with people. Just as many of her friends have become

clients, many of her clients have become friends.

"I try to understand them, and to tailor their home to their individual needs. That's why my projects are all different, because they reflect the personality of their owners," she says, defining her style as "eclectic selfexpressionism".

With Kari's professional and

personal lives closely intertwined, there's been plenty of stardust sprinkled on both.

She met Don Johnson while working on his popular 1980s cop show *Miami Vice* and, after his split from actress Melanie Griffith, they started dating. Soon the designer became part of the family.

Another of the designer's clients and friends is Jessica Alba, who shares two of her key interests. "Jessica was eco-friendly before it was cool. She is also passionate about animals, especially dogs," Kari tells us.

And here we come to the real reason why the designer works as hard as she does: to support her charity Ace of Hearts, which is dedicated to finding permanent homes for rescue dogs living in temporary shelters.

## TRUE PASSION

She is so horrified by the fact that hundreds of animals are put down each day in Los Angeles, for lack of an alternative, that she donates half her earnings to the cause.

"I have a new tax advisor and when he saw my numbers, he said: 'Are you crazy?" she laughs.

"But he added: 'It's the most generous action I've witnessed in my career."

## HELPING HAND

She says: "When Hurricane Katrina destroyed part of New Orleans and the poor dogs were wandering the streets lost and hungry, we rescued them. [Actress] Daisy Fuentes not only helped me tremendously, but she also adopted two.

"Michael Keaton adores his animals. Like Kristen Bell, he's had me create a 'doggie oasis' in the garden for them. I feel very lucky to deal with such admirable people."

Kari also practises what she preaches when it comes to sustainability. "I convince









clients that recycling is a way of life," she says. "Sometimes they want to throw away an old sofa and I tell them: 'No, don't. Nowadays things aren't made as well as they used to be. We'll reupholster it and you'll see how good it can look."

As a former musician, she admits she has a soft spot for old pianos. In her villa, one that previously belonged to Mötley Crüe rocker Nikki Sixx takes pride of place.

"Nikki said he was thinking of getting rid of this. 'Get rid of it? With the history it has? I'll take care of it,' I said.

"Now it has a whole new life. It's been colourfully embellished by a famous graffiti artist, Amber Goldhammer and it reigns here.
